Faith and Helping Others

How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?

1 John 3:17

Serving a midday meal at the local shelter offers the opportunity to bless others with food and fellowship. A simple meal can be a lifeline for someone in need, but conversation can be one of the biggest blessings—for those serving as well as those being served.

My husband and I began volunteering at the shelter when our church alerted the congregation to the need for helpers. Washing vegetables, slicing potatoes, creating salads, and performing other tasks showed me that there is no small job at the shelter. Before the food line begins, a volunteer says a prayer thanking God for the meal and each person there. While serving the guests, we hold the plate and ask if they would like each item.
